NVLSP Comments in Support of Court of Federal Claims' Proposed Amendments to Rules on Military Pay

#### RE: Proposed Amendments to the Rules of the United States Court of Federal Claims

Dear Ma Reven

On June 3, 2024, the United States Court of Federal Claims (COFC) announced that it was seeking public comment on a series of proposed amendments to the United States Court of Federal Claims (RCFC).<sup>1</sup> The National Veterans Legal Services Program (NVLSP) is pleased to offer these comments on the proposed changes with a particular emphasis on the proposed amendments RCFC 62.1 and the newly-proposed Appendix K\* Procodure in Military Pay Cases.\*

NVLSP is a national nonprofit organization that has worked since 1981 to ensure that the operament delivers to our nation's 18 million veterans and active-duly personnel the benefits her, have earned through their millitary service to our country? An important component of NVLSP's work is assisting veterans who have been wrongfully deried medical retirement benefits. That component of NVLSP's mission manifests itself at the COFC through our representation of veterans in military pay cases.

The availability of timely, efficient, and effective judical review in the CDFC of administrative decisions by military records correction boards denying medical reliferants benefits is critical to a beliefly to serve our nation's veterans. Given our deep understanding of the challenges veterans for when litigating military matters before the CDFC, we believe we have an important perspective share on the importance of adopting the proposed changes to RCFC S2.1 and Appendix K and do is in some detail below.

#### A. Backgroun

Military pay cases in the COFC commonly involve the review of administrative decisions, made by the military, determining whether a service member should be medically retired due to being unfi "to perform the duties of (their) office, grade, rank, or rating." NVLSP Statement on the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs Office of Inspector General Report: Veterans Benefits Administration Did Not Identify All Vietnam Veterans Who Could Qualify for Retroactive Benefits

"It is an outrage that the VA continues to deny tens of thousands of Vietnam veterans exposed to Agent Orange and their survivors their rightful benefits," said Bart Stichman, Special Counsel and Co-Founder of NVLSP. "The class action court order VA agreed to 33 years ago required VA in 2021 to identify and redecide the claims of approximately 100,000 Vietnam veterans and their survivors who previously sought benefits for three diseases, including bladder cancer, that were recently added to the list of Agent Orange-related diseases. But the OIG report concludes that VA neglected to redecide the claims of tens of thousands of veterans who are likely entitled under the 1991 agreement to hundreds of millions of dollars in retroactive compensation."

This <u>report</u> documents the latest example of VA's failure to fully comply with the class action order to which VA agreed in 1991. The report examined the eligibility for VA benefits based on the landmark case of *Nehmer v. U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs*, a class action lawsuit brought by NVLSP attorneys in 1986 to challenge a VA regulation, former 38 C.F.R. 3.311a, that stated, among other things, that chloracne is the only disease that scientific evidence shows is associated with exposure to herbicides like Agent Orange used by the United States in Vietnam. 
#### LITIGATION UPDATE

NVLSP Files Supreme Court Amicus Brief with National Organization of Veterans' Advocates Supporting "Benefit of the Doubt" Rule for Veterans

On July 9, 2024, the National Veterans Legal Services Program (NVLSP) <u>filed</u> another amicus curiae brief in *Joshua E. Bufkin and Norman F. Thornton v. Denis* 

McDonough, Secretary of Veterans Affairs urging the Supreme Court to hold that the U.S. Court of Appeals for Veterans Claims (Veterans Court) must review factual findings by the VA to ensure that veterans receive the benefit of the doubt on any close issue relating to their eligibility for service-related benefits. NVLSP's brief argues that the lower court misinterpreted how the benefit-of-the-doubt rule applies to the Veterans Court and that Congress intended to bolster the Veterans Court's review process and reduce unnecessary delays in the system. The National Organization of Veterans' Advocates (NOVA) joined NVLSP's brief. The amici curiae brief was filed with the pro bono assistance of Williams & Connolly LLP.

# **NVLSP Challenges Feres Doctrine in Supreme Court** Amicus Brief for Carter v. United States

On June 28, 2024, the National Veterans Legal Services Program (NVLSP) and Save Our Servicemembers filed an amicus brief in Carter v. United States. This brief urges the Supreme Court of the United States to revisit and overrule the highly criticized Feres doctrine, which prevents servicemembers from suing the federal government under the Federal Tort Claims Act for injuries sustained "incident to service." NVLSP argues that the doctrine is outdated and unjust, depriving servicemembers and their families of just legal

remedies. This case represents a crucial opportunity for the Court to correct this longstanding injustice. The amici curiae brief was filed with the pro bono assistance of Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe LLP.
